INTRODUCTION

Every year in March, Downview School holds its Governors Open Morning. During our time in the school we visit every single class and attend any school assemblies.

Just like our individual governor visits, the Governors Open Day has a focus and the focus is linked to the School Improvement Plan. This year our focus was on Reading but we also wanted to ask some of the children four questions. The four questions we asked were:

- What have you been learning about recently in your class?
- What are you good at?
- How do you know you are good at it?
- If you could change one thing about our school what would it be?

We would like to emphasize that a small random sample of children were asked the same 4 questions, the governors recognise that these are individual children's opinions on the day and may not necessarily be representative of the school as a whole.

The Governors had a pleasurable and enjoyable morning and we would like to thank all the staff and children for welcoming us into their classrooms. We would particularly like to thank all the children who kindly agreed to chat with us and answer our questions. They were all very polite, open and honest with their answers. A delight to talk to.

Governors Report

We started off our morning by visiting Years two and three. Year three were split into five groups for their Book Club. One group was supervised by their teacher; three groups were supervised by TA's and a group who were working on their own. These groups are rotated. The children told us they read the book three times they thought the first time was to understand it, they couldn't remember what the second time was for but the third time was to remember it. The children in year three really enjoyed having their Book Club.

When chatting to the children in year three we decided to sit in the book corner as we thought that as we were focusing on reading this would be an apt place to sit. We were discussing various things and one of the children was able to show me without any hesitation where Calgary was on the globe and how to fly there.

In Year 2 the children were also reading in groups, supervised by the teacher and the TA's. The groups were organized in reading ability. I spent my time reading with 3 individuals of differing ability. The first was unable to read until 4 weeks before the visit. He was brilliant! Really keen and excited just to be able to read to me and tackled, what I thought were difficult words by using the strategies that he had been taught. He was clearly relishing his new found world of books. The other two children were more able readers tackling harder books but they were equally enjoying their reading - overall it was a very enjoyable lesson.

We then went onto visit years five and six. Year six were spending time reading and annotating various types of literature as they were planning to write a speech using persuasive text. The children were planning to show their parents their speeches on Parents Evening. They were working in mixed ability groups, some with a teacher, some with a TA and some on their own. The theme of their speech was what they should be allowed to do on their birthdays i.e. if they should be allowed the day off school or just as they do now come to school in non school uniform. Or, maybe they should be allowed to do something else on their birthdays.

We visited both Year 5 groups; one was working on their mental maths albeit using their individual white boards. The children were seated on the floor around their teacher who was asking questions around the class. The children were attentive and were learning from each other as well as the teacher. In the other class the children were working in groups on their maths also. Working in

groups of similar ability they were demonstrating collaborative and independent learning.

Having visited four year groups it was time for assembly and the governors visited the KS1 assembly. This was being run by two teachers. The assembly started off by giving out awards for children who had done a lot of reading and then to children whom had got their various stars for the number of house points. A birthday cake was then brought out and children with birthdays on that day were called up to the front. There were quite a lot of them, they all blew out the candles in the cake in unison.

One of the teachers, with the help of the Year two children told the story of Palm Sunday. She told the story whilst the children acted it out. The palms the children used were made by themselves prior to the assembly and they were going to take them home.

After assembly we visited reception, years one and four. The group of children that talked to us had just had a guided reading session before break and assembly. They told us that the book they had been reading was about Rockets and how to build them. They were all very chatty about the excitements of the day as it was Mrs Holloway's 40th birthday.

In all the year groups we visited the atmosphere was buzzing. Lots of happy children concentrating on their learning and enjoying their learning. They were all happy for us to go into their classrooms and talk to them. All the children we spoke to were very polite, and open and honest with their responses to our questions.

Questions and Answers

We asked all year groups the same four questions and we got some very honest and sometimes amusing answers!

- Q1. What have you been learning about recently in your class?
 - Owls
 - The Gruffalo and also bear hunt
 - Easter
- Q2. What are you good at?
 - Reading
 - Easter egg Hunts
 - Riding my two wheeled scooter
 - Riding my bike
 - Helping my sister to find the orange eggs at my Grandmas Easter Egg Hunt
- Q3. How do you know you are good at it?
 - As we are really clever
 - I get stickers
- Q4. If you could change one thing about our school what would it be?
 - You can wear whatever you want
 - Not getting told off

Year 1:

Q1. What have you been learning about recently in your class?

- The jolly postman we wrote a story about it, who he visited including a fox
- All the people in it

Q2. What are you good at?

- Drawing nice pictures
- Doing the work
- Reading

Q3. How do you know you are good at it?

- Because my daddy shows me how to draw
